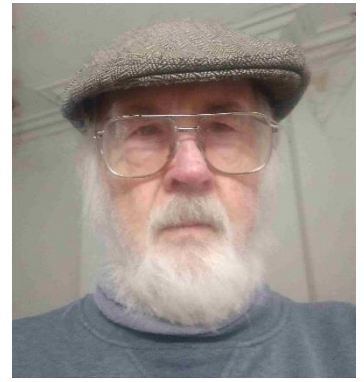
I also dig holes, wash dishes, clean up rubbish and be generally helpful.
